

Happy New Year!

It sounds like this is going to be a good spring to have a bunch of roping calves to sell. With the continuing trend of breeding Corriente cows to beef bulls, the supply of calves is down and the demand seems good again this year.

Members and non-members alike want to raise a good calf. If you want to raise good calves, you need good bloodlines and NACA members are the ones who have the time-tested, good bloodlines. We need to continue to register those heifer and bull calves that we sell so we can protect the gene pool for future breeders.

The demand for Corriente beef is also still good. We went to the effort to get our Certified Corriente Beef Trademark to help protect our market share and have a product we can promote. Now we need to use it and start getting the word out about how good it is. Join the beef producer group and let's see what we can do.

If you are having trouble finding a consistent market for your beef, you might contact your local food banks or food hubs. Many of them have recently gotten grants to buy protein and they tell me beef is hard to find.

We will be awarding two \$500 scholarships this spring. We are very excited about the opportunity to help a couple of NACA member families meet their educational goals. Nikki will have more information on this.

You have probably noticed that our new web site is finally up and going. It is not all done the way we would like it yet, but it is functioning. If you have problems with it, let someone know.

We tried to outsource some of the office work last year. That didn't work very well. Not because people didn't try, but I think because we didn't realize how critical knowledge of Corriente cows and Corriente cow people was. Where the Heck are We?

Oh, you know, back in 1982. When we say that, it doesn't sound like it's that long ago. But in all reality, when you do the math, it's 40 years ago. It's been that long since this association has been in existence, and it's been that long that members have held true to providing the best Corriente cattle out there. But 1982 is nothing like "Columbus sailed the ocean blue in 1492", which was when the base of our breed may have come to our land. When reading all the history notes of the association, it tells of the trek these cattle made to Hispanola, made their way over into Mexico and then eventually came across the border.

Without going into the full blown out history of the NACA, which is a topic for another time, I would like to recap where we've been, what the heck we are in the middle of right now, and where in the wild west this could take us in the future.

The NACA was based on the thought of "we can't find good roping cattle, so let's go find them and raise them ourselves" And that crazy is what happens when you bring cattle from Mexico, get a bunch of cowboys together to compare notes, rope a little, and drink a lot of whiskey...from what I've been told, that was way before my time. But back in those wild days, the cowboys did have a moment of seriousness and put together some pretty decent cattle to start our registry. The registry started off as percentage and now we are strictly a purebred registry.

That "heyday" stuck around for quite a few years. Between 1985ish and 2007ish, were the glory days and we saw thousands of cattle registered by the members. The big boom was great. There were so many years of Corriente cattle bringing the same price as beef cattle. Which was great profit for the Corriente breeder since their cattle would cost a whole lot less to feed than the beefers.

So how do we go from the glory days from where we are now? Well, great question. A couple things. It got a whole lot easier to move cattle across the border and secondly, everyone was raising Corrientes. Back in the day, it took an Act of Congress to move anything across the border (which is a whole lot different than today, they let anything cross now. Literally. Which is another discussion, different day.) That's when we really strengthened our relationships with our Mexico neighbors and brought them into the association. I would have to say, that back in the day there were a lot more cattle that were "pure" coming across than today. Today we are finding that a lot of the roping cattle may prove to be heavier than purebred cattle found in the United States.

So now we have this influx of cattle and anyone can get their hands on them. That price dropped faster than a hot potato. When the bottom went out of the market, we lost a lot of our members. We had cattle being sold and members putting beef bulls on our Corriente gals, hoping to wait out this little game the market was playing. But it's still playing its game on us. It's been a long while since Corrientes have been worth a pretty penny. Which has also built the mentality in a lot of cowboys and stock contractors that they only want to give half of what beef cattle are being sold for. Put into account that the ropers get used for 2-3 years, then they need to be dropped like that hot potato, and where are they supposed to be dropped....they aren't bringing much at that point.

Cue the beef side of the operation. We have a handful of members that have figured this portion out and are very successful. They are taking the roped out steers and providing an end value to the consumer. And that end value is a very healthy one, I might add. Corriente beef is one of the leanest meats, low in cholesterol and so good for the heart. Several have figured out the marketing ploy in this and have built a strong customer base in their local areas. While it has been successful to many on the

smaller scale, it's still difficult to get packers to take in these "horned cattle" for processing. Some don't believe they feed out as well as regular cattle and they don't want to deal with the horns. So in turn again, no one is wanting to pay much for them.

So now what we have is a total debacle, unless you have the game figured out. Here's that game that some of our members have figured out: raise the cattle, lease or sell the roping cattle, get back or buy back the roping cattle, and either feed them out or breed them, butcher and sell the meat locally to the consumer. In some areas of the US this is working like a charm, but what it really comes down to is if you have the patience to follow through with the rat race. And that is why so many producers are letting their cattle go at cheaper prices.

Now about that whole mentality thing. Let's look over on the consumer side. First, the ropers have had it in their head they don't have to pay much for cattle anymore. So they want a cheap critter, but want it to be nice and shiny and run perfectly every time. Wait, what? These guys will go give away their first born to have the nicest horses to rope off, but don't want to spend a little extra for good practice and rodeo cattle? Where's my BS flag. Cue the M cattle. (Mexican steers, not purebred, brought across the border, branded with an "M" on their right hip.)

While it drives the regular Corriente producer totally to the other side of the wall to see M branded cattle, the ropers are roping them as a cheaper route. So our NACA members have been providing THE best American made cattle over the years, and now they aren't fitting into the roper's program anymore. In some parts of the pro rodeo circuit, only M branded cattle can be used in the steer wrestling, there are just a couple of states where this rule is null and void and natives can be used.

It's a struggle for sure. Well, where do we go from here, what are we doing, what day is it, what's my name again....kidding, I know how to answer some of those.....

Well, I do believe the times are changing. I know we've been saying that for the last 10-12 years, but it just makes sense now for a couple reasons. In the last few years, members and commercial cattlemen have been breeding Corriente cows to beef bulls, and I do mean that in a majority sense. What we have left in the association now, are the ride or diers, the guys that are not quitting, they are not giving up on those purebred genetics. There aren't a lot of those "good guys" left. These good guys are taking plenty of orders right now for cattle. People are wanting to buy cows, which aren't around anymore as many of them were slaughtered in this last stint when there was no feed in the country. Good ropers are hard to find as the Corriente cows were producing beef calves for the last few years. It's slim pickings. And when these members are taking the phone calls, it's not just for a handful; that customer is looking for a small herd. So what's that telling me? Either people are ready for the upswing and getting ready to make money on this deal or they are just tired of not being able to find their own cattle and want to raise their own. Which sounds familiar to me, flash back to 40 years ago. And let's look back at that border. Even though cattle can come across, it may take months of them sitting in quarantine, then you have to pay the feed bill while they sit and wait, which is a pretty pricey feed bill.

So there you have it folks, the story in a few paragraphs. And after that, we still don't have "the rest of the story" figured out.

But here's hoping that it ends on a positive note. Here's to hoping this Corriente market will change for the good, and let the good guys win.

Until then, we will keep marching on and making it work, like we do every single day.
